"THIS PAPER will appeal to all intelligent, curious, thinking Christians."


So says Carolyn O'Doherty, the Distribution Manager of the new fortnightly paper, 'Alpha'.

WHO DOESN'T REMEMBER Pope John Paul's visit to Ireland ten years ago? About two and a half million people in all made their way, setting out before dawn, often on foot, to one or other of the venues where he spoke. Just about every person over the age of sixteen has vivid memories of where they were and what they were thinking and doing during that warm September weekend in 1979.

He was the first Pope ever to come to Ireland. His visit was a special event and it burned itself deeply into the consciousness of the Irish people.

To mark the 10th Anniversary of the visit, RTE plan to show a special documentary, called "The Whola World In His Hands". Through archive footage, personal stories and commentaries it will recreate the tension, excitement and uniqueness of the occasion; it will be shown on RTE 1, Friday, 29th September, at 7.30 p.m.

IF DIVORCE IS SO WRONG, WHY WAS IT OK FOR ST. JOSEPH TO THINK OF DIVORCING MARY WHEN HE FOUND OUT SHE WAS PREGNANT? AND WEREN'T THEY ONLY ENGAGED - WHY THE NEED FOR DIVORCE?

At the time, engagement or betrothal was the commitment. And divorce was quite acceptable them. It was Jesus who ruled it out:-"Moses allowed you to divorce your wives....but I say to you: whoever divorces his wife and marries another commits adultery.." (See Matthew 19: 3-9)

IT SAID IN THE BULLETIN LATELY THAT EVERY PERSON IN THE PARISH IS AS IMPORTANT TO THE PARISH AS THE PARISH PRIEST. SURELY THIS MUST BE A MISPRINT?

It all depends on your vision of the Church. For many years, up to the Vatican Council, the Pope, Bishops and priests were the only people who mattered in the Church people thought of the Church as a pyramid, with the laity at the bottom.

Since the Council, the Church seems more like a circle, centred on Christ. And everyone in that circle is as important and valuable. Priesthood is one Ministry among many.

WHY DO OUR MINISTERS OF THE EUCH-ARIST NOT WASH THEIR HANDS BEFORE DISTRIBUTING HOLY COMMUNION ?

They do wash their hands - at home before they set out for Mass, as everyone else does. That is enough - we don't want to turn them into incessant handwashers! Besides, handwashing would interupt the flow of the Liturgy.

CHALLENGE

WE ARE concerned, on the Bulletin team, that there is a credibility gap between the Church∴in Ballineaspaig and the young people who are part of that Church.

We feel challenged - and we challenge you too - to do something abour reducing that gap.

We think we know some of your problems. But unless we hear from you, we won't know for sure.

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SUPPOSE we were to suggest the following sample, would you agree?
"I get nothing from the Mass; I find it boring." Or, "Sermons say nothing to me." "My parents don't understand me." "This Country is a dead loss; nobody cares about young people."

FOR A START we Do care. We care very much because you are our future out Parish's future, our Church's future, our Country's future.

Yes, many priests neglect to prepare a meaningful homily and this is sad. In many instances the Mass liturgy is ill-prepared and this, too, is sad

But can I (and can you) say honestly that we always prepare well for the Sunday Eucharist? We too, are called by God in our vocation as Christians. We are all 'church'.

AS ADULTS concerned about our role in the Parish, we extend an invitation to young people to formulate

ation to young people to formulate for us their hopes, their grievances and aspirations. We envisage a monthly column, at least to start with. We invite you to participate fully. Don't treat it as an agony column but as something forward-looking and vibrant.
