The CHAPLAINCY HOUSE, better known to all as 'The House' is where the team lives and is only a short walk from the college. It is an OPEN HOUSE which means that students can come and go as they please for a chat over a cup of tea, or just to sit down and relax between lectures. It is an important off the campus facility for students. Among the activities that take place in the house are DISCUSSION GROUPS. Students come together, usually on a Tuesday night, pick a topic and have a discussion on it. It also provides an opportunity for students to make new friends. There is a 24 HOUR PRESENCE at the house at all times, which means a member of the team is always there. We keep the house neat and tidy to make it a place of welcome and, for the students who call, they are always made feel at home with a friendly and relaxed atmosphere prevailing at all times.

Side by side to each other

we have an office, a counselling room and a chapel. THE OFFICE is the anchor point in the college for the team where we can meet each other during the day. There is always a member of the team there to take any incoming calls or any important message that may come through. THE COUNSELLING ROOM offers the privacy that may be required in certain counselling situations. The team presumes nothing about any student, their background or what they may be going through. We offer a listening ear to any student who may want to share worries, anxieties or problems. Confidentiality and the integrity of the student are respected by the team. However, to say that the Chaplaincy is just a problem solving agency would be inaccurate as the function of the team is much more varied than that. The CHAPEL, also known as the Quiet Room or Prayer Room, offers a student a quiet oasis where they can take a break from the noisy and hectic pace of daily college life. It does not matter what beliefs a student may hold; what is important is that the room is there for them in their own time, at their own pace and in their own way.
