
I have too a sense of wishing

Greater Love than this ...

What is your picture of a Trappist monk? I'm sure it would not be all that different from mine: a serene man living out his life in Mount Melleray, dividing his day between morning and evening chant, the Eucharist, simple meals, manual work, silent prayer. And, at the end, a gentle passage from this world to the next.

Not so for Fr. Christian de Charge, prior of a Cistercian monastery in the Atlas mountains. Along with seven other monks he murdered by Algerian terrorists, this 59 year "a described as gentle charming person" with a deep love and respect for the Muslim religion and the Koran.

In a letter to his family in France written in 1993, but not opened until after his death, he forgave (in advance) his would-be murderer, calling him "my last-minute friend, you who know not what you do. May we be granted to meet each other again, happy thieves, in paradise, should it please God, the Father of both of us. Amen! Inshallah!"

What a profound statement and example to those who treat life so trivially and so insensitively in this poor country of ours. And how fortunate we are to have a God whose patience and love for forgiveness is so so limitless.
