I have another sad memory from that trip. In every hotel room was a booklet, outlining the history of the Jewish people from Abraham to our own time. In that booklet there is no mention whatever of Jesus Christ, or that He ever lived.

It was so sad to think that the One who could heal and soothe the wounds and pain was totally ignored. He was the one who taught forgiveness even as He too suffered the awful pain of crucifixion. "Father forgive them, they know not what they do."

except those whose lives have been devastated by the killing.


