



THE WORD WAS MADE FLESH

The emphasis during the Christmas season so far is on the real humanity of Jesus. This is highlighted by his birth as son of Mary, the focus of the family at Bethlehem and Nazareth. The emphasis this weekend is on the fact that Jesus is divine. The challenge is how to express this central truth.

For the Hebrews, the spoken word was very precious and personal. It was inseparable from the speaker and it also revealed the person who spoke it. Thus God revealed himself through the words of his prophets who spoke on his behalf. More specifically, it is especially through his Son, Jesus Christ, that God reveals himself fully to us. So Jesus is described as the Word of God, the perfect showing forth of God.

Of course, the Son of God has always existed, so we read,

"In the beginning was the Word: The Word was with God and the Word was God."

This weekend's gospel goes on to speak of the "Word" as one who brings "light" insofar as he is the revealer of God. Many refuse to accept what is on offer, but those who do accept become children of God.
