

Fr. Walsh came to Ballineaspaig from the Lough Parish four years ago and now leaves us to take up his new appointment as Chaplain at University College, Cork. He leaves with the good wishes of the entire community in this parish, and what is our loss is, indeed, UCC's gain.

Fr. Patrick is a man of many parts, and during his time here he made a notable contribution to the life of the community Ballineaspaig. He will be remembered. particularly. for introducing and organising Lent on the Edge at lunchtime each Wednesday during Lent. It was an innovative and courageous decision to arrange this series of talks at a time of the day when most people would not think of going to the church. But his choice of speakers people like Nuala O'Loan, Fr. Peter McVerry and John Lonergan - and topics ensured a full house on each occasion. Truly a remarkable achievement. He followed up on the success of the Lenten talks with The Light Within, a series of reflection during Advent in preparation for Christmas. This was facilitated at lunchtime on Wednesdays in 2002 by Fr. Donagh O'Shea.

Fr. Patrick's work with the Liturgy Committee and his commitment to developing a greater understanding and appreciation of the Liturgy of the Mass among the members of this community is also worthy of mention. His contribution to the enrichment of the Easter Vigil and the organisation of the large fire outside the church was

particularly noteworthy, and his encouragement of greater participation and singing by the congregation at Mass, especially at the 10.30 a.m. Mass must also be mentioned. He led by example in the singing.

During his time here, Fr. Patrick served as chaplain to Mount Mercy College and was an active and valued member of the Parish Pastoral Council. His many contributions to the deliberations of that body were always incisive and challenging. He will be greatly missed by all his friends in this parish including his Bridge friends. But then he is not moving too far away, and he will manage to maintain contact.

Finally, on behalf of the members of the parish community, we take this opportunity to wish Fr. Patrick every happiness and success in his challenging new ministry. Rath Dé ar a shaothar.

DEATH ON A CROSS

St. Paul was a very reluctant convert to Jesus but, once converted, he was on fire in his proclamation of the gospel. He was completely captivated by the fact that the Son of God not only became human but "even accepted death, death on a cross" for us, as the second reading puts it this weekend.

Death on a cross was not only an excruciating way to die, but was the most ignominious way for a criminal to be executed at the time. Crucifixion was not inflicted on Roman citizens but was reserved for slaves and non-Romans who had committed heinous crimes like murder or treason, the crime for which Jesus was officially condemned. So the mystery for Paul, himself a Roman citizen, and for us, is that this most shame loaded execution could be the instrument of God's saving love.

Jesus foretold his crucifixion and Christians quickly adopted the sign of the Cross as the symbol of their loyalty to Jesus and as a way of accessing the treasury of God's redemptive love.

Hence, this weekend's feast of the Triumph of the Cross.
