

PCB - The Dreaded Illness

So here we are again. Happy New Year to all our readers!! It takes a while to get used to writing 2005, and seeing it on the diary etc, doesn't it? It doesn't seem that long since the millennium! Tell me, are you suffering this week from a mild, or even a bad dose of PCB, I wonder? What's that, you say? It's a seasonal religious disease, diagnosed by the Doctors of the Church, which even true believers often suffer from at this time of the year: Post-Christmas Blues! FAVOURITES: ONE AND ALL

Cork people are reputed to be very secure about their roots. Indeed, it is said sometimes that Corkonians actually have sympathy for those who were not lucky enough to be born as one of themselves. St. Peter grew up in a similar environment and into similar attitudes. The Hebrews saw themselves as God's chosen people and others as outsiders who were less precious in God's eyes. True, the Hebrews were chosen for a particular role in history, to facilitate the coming of Jesus, the Messiah, into the world but that task did not bring superior entitlements with it. Even after the death and resurrection of Jesus, Peter thought the salvation brought by Jesus was especially for convert Jews only. It took a divinely inspired vision to alert Peter to the fact that "God does not have favourites". But once Peter grasped that truth, his enthusiastic preaching reached out to all, as we see in the history of the early church as recounted in this weekend's second reading.
