CHRISTMAS MESSAGE

It is fitting that we would celebrate the feast of Christmas in a spirit of generosity. It is a good thing to give gifts at Christmas; they should be a sign of the love and Christian affection which we have for our families and friends, and a sharing with others who may not have the necessities and comforts which we enjoy.

Nowhere has the command to love your neighbour more meaning than in the home, because it is there that the nearest neighbour lives. That nearest neighbour can make the greatest demands on your love and generosity, while at the same time providing the greatest opportunity of helping others.

In looking at the feast of Christmas, let us take note that God's gift to us at Christmas was not wealth or fame or fortune, but a person, a humble child in a stable in Bethlehem. He gave us a person. Perhaps, our greatest gift to our families this Christmas could be ourselves: The husband or the wife, the son or daughter, who stay at home, rather than go to the party or public house; making time for the family. Rather than compensating with material things for our absence; the extra effort made to be home earlier or more often, to share ourselves with those who need us, though it may interfere with what we want; declining that last drink – a course which will probably benefit all. That extra prayer and devotion with the family will help to keep in mind that the feast which we are celebrating is a religious rather than a secular one.

We wish our parishioners every blessing, happiness and peace for Christmas and the New Year, and we pray that the year 2010 will bring much improvement and prosperity.

A special remembrance for our Missionaries and all our people who are away from home who may be in need of our prayers at this time. We place them all under the protection of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Using slides, he gave us a clear picture of the building process and the enormous difference that it would make to the lives of the people in rural Turkwel. Through the generous sponsorship of the people of this parish, a health clinic with a laboratory, examination rooms and other patient care rooms has been built along with a small accommodation block for staff, and a toilet block.




